ANA National Money Show
March 9-11, 2017
Orlando, FL

The ANA National Money Show was March 9-11, 2017 in Orlando, Florida. The weather was great with the high around 80 degrees and the low 62 degrees every day. There were 232 dealer booths, including ten club tables, kid's zone, wizard supply, an exhibit area, PCGS, NGC, ICG, ANACS and the Museum Showcase.

Kagin's had the auction, 1050 high quality lots of U.S. coins & paper money. There were ten educational programs, several specialty club meetings, and four coin club buses that brought 159 collectors to the show on Friday, sponsored by FUN.

The Best of Show exhibit went to **Dennis Schafluetzel** for "*Chattanooga Iron Company*

Script". The People's Choice Award went to **Jerry Stubblefield** for "*Uses and Abuses of Early Copper Coins*". The YN program had 54 Boy Scouts and 13 Girl Scouts.

In the Museum Showcase was the 1804 Silver Dollar, the 1913 Liberty Head Nickel, and a 1792 Half Disme. There was also a display of currency from all 59 different cities that issued large & small size Florida National Bank Notes. There were all varieties of the World War 1 victory medals. Also on display were Ancient Dekadrachms, 1715 Fleet coins, and U.S. error notes.

FUN was the host club with help from the Central Florida Coin Club, making a great team of volunteer ambassadors. Cindy Wibker was the general chairman of the show.

Students Can Cash in at Coin Club

Coin Club is an afterschool activity that allows students to collect and find coins of their choice and find out what they are valued. Mr. Pecoraro, also known as Mr. P, is the one responsible for the running of the club. His club is sponsored by the American-Polish Coin Club, and he is a proud member of that club.

The main activity in Coin Club is the packaging of coins. The process of packaging is, first, finding coins, and then, searching in a coin catalog for their value. The coin catalogs can be found either on a computer or in a book.

Next, students can package the coin if the value is one dollar or higher. Coins lower may not be packaged. The package is stapled shut with the coin inside. Once students finish with the packaging, they can put down the information about the coin on the package, such as: the year it was made, country or origin, the condition, and value.

Finally, the coin is put in a slot that is meant to hold the packaged coin in a binder that members of the coin club keep. The purpose of coin club is for a fun hobby that anyone can enjoy, and anybody would be able to find interest in it. All of this is done in Mr. P's classroom on Mondays and Wednesdays after school.
