ANA World's Fair of Money
Denver, CO
August 1-5, 2017

The ANA show was held at the Colorado Convention Center in downtown Denver, CO. The convention center was massive and multi-

level. The coin show was on the second floor right with meeting room's downstairs center. There were 322 dealer booths manning 464 tables. Attending the show were: The US Mint, B.E.P., eight World Mints, 30 specialty club meetings, The Museum Showcase, Kid's Zone & Treasure Trivia, Exhibit area, Coin Collector 101, 20 club tables, and Whitman Publishing (coin supplies). There were 15 "Money Talks" educational programs.

On display were the 1913 Liberty Nickel (five known), 1804 Silver Dollar (15 known), A 1783 Nova Constellatio in silver, reported to be the first struck US coin, 1792 Half Disme graded SP-68, two 1933 \$20 St. Gaudens (11 known), 1974-D Aluminum Cent, Colorado Territorial Gold & Currency, and 18 Leshner Dollars. The Exhibit area had 60 exhibits. The Best of Show was "The Colorized Seal Notes of Colonial Georgia" by Robert Rhue. The People's Choice award went to "Rush to the Rockies, The Golden Growth of the Denver Mint" by Jeff Rosinia. There were 51 exhibit judges.

The Sheraton Denver Downtown was the host hotel. It was six blocks from the convention center. The hotel was on the 16th street Pedestrian Mall, a mile-long street with shops and restaurants. No vehicles were allowed on the mall, only free shuttle buses. The US Mint was two and a half blocks from the hotel. Mint tour tickets were available at the coin show for free. My wife and I went to the US Mint, the Federal Reserve Money Museum, and the Colorado History Museum.

The airport was about 20 miles NE of downtown and the cab fare was \$65. The weather was great with temperatures around 85 degrees in the day and 60 degrees at night, with no humidity.

The ANA Banquet was Friday night at the Sheraton. Awards were announced, the new ANA officers & Board were installed, and they

had a silent auction. Saturday morning I attended the ANA District Representative meeting. We had 30 there including ANA President Gary Adkins and ANA Executive Director Kim Kiick. The Heritage Auction realized \$30.8 million. StacksBowers auction realized over \$19 million.

At the FUN table, we gave out *FUN Topics*, magnifiers, lanyards, medals, and lapel pins. We had lots of free tootsie rolls & Hersey candy. Cindy sold tables for our January FUN show in Tampa. Cindy & I judged exhibits. I gave a talk on Obsolete currency and I passed out nomination forms for Numismatic Ambassador Award.

Nancy Wilson, Ocala Coin Club, 2nd Place exhibit, "The Battleship Note".

Proof Jefferson Nickel Varieties

Recently, a well-known guide book to varieties printed volume six "6" and with it came a new list of coins for me to find/search/hunt. I will point out, although the book covers half cents to nickels, I only collect Proof Jefferson nickels and this is what I will cover.

So, what are the newly listed varieties?
Remember, I collect Proof Jeffersons:

1. 1938 Re-Engraved Die 401
2. 1938 Re-Engraved Die 402
3. 1938 Re-Engraved Die 403
4. 1952 Re-Engraved Die 401
5. 1952 Re-Engraved Die 402
6. 1952 Re-Engraved Die 403
7. 1952 Re-Engraved Die 404
8. 1953 Re-Engraved Die 401
9. 1954 Re-Engraved Die 401
10. 1969-S Repunched Mintmark
11. 1971-S Doubled-Die Reverse
12. 1990-S Doubled-Die Obverse

Yes, I have a lot of coins to look for and what a surprise and shock to see all of the above listed coins recently added to the "PCGS 1938 - Present Complete Variety" set registry program. All of these coins left huge holes for all those variety sets, to include my own set. My plan is to cover each variety by the specific year and make everyone more knowledgeable. I have found, even though individuals (i.e. dealers at coin shows) tell me they have searched through their coins for varieties, I keep finding them.

So, for this month I will not cover any of the varieties above, but I can tell you after looking through what I already had within my collection, I found three from the coins listed above and sent them to PCGS for variety grading. Each coin did in fact come back with the variety listed and one coin is at the top of the population with 14 graded PR68 and only one graded PR68 RED-402, the very coin I sent in.

Again, if the dealers tell you "I have already looked through my coins". KEEP LOOKING! Three months ago I found a 1971-S Proof Jefferson nickel at the West Palm Beach coin show. I bought it for \$1.50 and sent it to PCGS. It is now in my registry set and only one of two coins with this such variety. Additional,

at the Hollywood show I bought a 1969-S Proof set (\$6.00) and sent in the nickel. Yes, it too came back graded as a variety, (1969-S RPM). I listed this coin on eBay at the low price of \$499.00 and it sold. This was from the dealer who said he checked his coins for varieties. OK!

So take a look at your proof Jefferson nickels and you might have something more than what you think and if you have any questions, feel free to catch me at the club meetings. I should have my name tag on and I am always willing to talk Proof Jefferson nickels. More next month.
