ANA World's Fair of Money August 8–12, 2023 Pittsburgh, PA

We arrived in Pittsburgh on Monday, August 7th. My flight on Southwest was 2-1/2 hours late. The weather was in the low 80's and upper 60's at night. Our Hotel, the Omni William Penn, was about six blocks from the David L Lawrence convention center on the Allegany River in downtown Pittsburgh.

Tuesday, we set up our table in the club's section, we had a nice corner. There were 492 dealer booths, which included PCGS with seven. NGC with eight, Heritage with eight, Stacks-Bowers with eight, and Great Collections with eight. The U.S. Mint was there selling the proof 2023 silver dollars. There were 16 booths of World Mints. They had a "Kid's Zone", Treasure Hunt, 24 club booths, and Whitman Publishing. The Tyrants Collection of early British coins was on display. PCGS had a complete 1880 U.S. Proof Set on display with the two Four-dollar Stella's. There were 58 exhibitors and 41 exhibit judges for 20 different exhibit categories. Cindy Wibker and I judged exhibits and YN Best of Show exhibits. Tony Bonaro certified as an ANA exhibit judge for U.S. coins.

Many awards were handed out, including six for Florida. FUN Topics received 3rd place in the Regional Magazine competition, Tony Bonaro received ANA's Glenn Smedley Award and Joe Zelinski received the Lawrence Gentile Memorial Award for Outstanding Adult Advisor. Robert Mellor received the Century Club Award. Greater Jacksonville Coin Club was recognized for 50 years in the ANA. John and Nancy Wilson received ANA's Philanthropy Award.

I took the NGC grading contest and came in 15th out of 150 participants. FUN had a successful show with over 40 dealer table contracts received for our January show and about 10 new FUN members signed up. It helps that we are there to talk up our January show to the public and the dealers.

I attended the ANA District Representative meeting on Friday, where we had over 30 attendees. We all attended the ANA Banquet on Friday night at the Westin Hotel. The major ANA awards were handed out there and the new ANA officers and Board of Governors were sworn in.

Cindy and Katie flew out on Saturday on Southwest with a direct flight to Orlando. I was not so lucky. I had Southwest to Baltimore with a connecting flight to West Palm Beach. Getting to Baltimore was ok, but the flight to WPB was delayed 4-1/2 hours until midnight, so I flew to Ft. Lauderdale and got home just after midnight. Tony Bonaro drove.

Denny's Minutia's Coins 1953-D/S Washington Quarter Controversy by Denny Thostenson

As I have stated before in this column, there are new things to be discovered.

While the easy varieties have been discovered many decades ago, there are still new varieties being discovered everyday.

While not everyone agrees on claims, including the experts, it is still fun to find these new varieties. For you to decide, all you need to do is find a specimen yourself and examine it.

This article is one such topic. The 1953-D/S Washington quarter is a classic example.

One well known author/researcher that I highly respect, for his decades of numismatic research, is Walter Breen. In his 1988 book, *Walter Breen's Complete Encyclopedia of U.S. and Colonial Coins*, Walter listed this alleged overmintmark (Breen number 4367).

Another researcher I have personally known for over 50 years, is Bill Fivaz. Bill is one of today's widely known and most respected researcher/author. Bill, and close friend the late J.T. Stanton, put out the official Whitman Guidebook The Cherrypickers' Guide. In the 2012 fifth edition, volume two, they listed the overmintmark as 1953-D-601(022.3). In their excellent listing, they included three photographs of the mintmark. An early die state (very clear mintmark), a middle die state, and a late die state.

They described it as a D/D/D/S/S. They listed the value in MS63 at \$125 with the caveat that only the early die states should bring the value listed, as the longer the die was in production, the less clear the variety became.



At the top of this article I mentioned the "controversy" surrounding this variety. The Official Red Book (*A Guidebook of United States Coins*) does NOT recognize this variety and does not include it in the 2023 76th edition.

I have personally known the previous editors of the *Red Book*, R.S. Yeoman, Kenneth Bressett and Neil Shafer. I have the utmost respect and admiration for all of those authors and researchers.

In my many years in this hobby, everyone of the above-mentioned people have patiently sat down with me and explained their feelings on a variety of topics. As I think back, they are probably the highlights of my numismatic career.

There is no better gift than a gift of knowledge.
