Presidents Message

The first club meeting in seven months, on October 14th, went very well with 49 members in attendance. We met in the coin show room with lots of space and everyone wore a mask. We had hand sanitizer and chairs and tables were spaced six feet apart. Steve Feiertag spoke and exhibited his 50-piece U.S. Commemorative Type Set, PCGS Registry Set #12. All coins were graded MS-64+ to MS-68. The meeting ended with a 100-lot auction.

We are taking \$30 deposits for the Club Bus Trip to the January FUN Show Friday, January 8th at 7AM, leaving from Inglesia Familiar Church parking lot, 855 Jog Rd, WPB. I have deposits from seven members for the cancelled July bus trip that I can apply to the January FUN Show trip, if you want to. Bus trip to FUN, \$30 deposit, \$20 back when you get on the bus. The address is 9899 International Dr., North/South Building, Hall SB. The Hilton Hotel is the closest to the convention with a skyway that takes three minutes. It is the same rate as the Rosen Center Hotel (\$159) but FUN has only 55 rooms blocked off in the Hilton. Make reservations thru FUN phone number, not on your own. Rosen Center is about a 10-minute walk.

FUN Show registration is on the 2nd floor, the show is on the 1st floor. All meetings are on 3rd floor. Masks, temperature check, hand sanitizer and signing a hold harmless agreement are in place.

I have the 2021 Red Books - hard cover is \$9.50, soft cover is \$8.50, available at the meeting or at

our coin show. 2021 Calendars are \$1. All are limited quantities while they last.

We had a club Board meeting October 21st and members will be happy to know that the Board voted to extend your paid 2020 club dues through 2021. All club members that have paid their dues in 2020 will be paid through 2021. If you have not paid your dues in 2020, you will owe 2021 dues. New members can pay now and be carried through 2021.

We need a club member to tally the Estate auctions and Slab auctions in 2021. Please see Tony.

Due to Covid19, we will not have a party in December. We will just have a regular meeting with an open auction for club members to put up to eight lots in the auction.

In the News

In October, NGC graded a EID MAR (Ides of March) Gold Aureus of Brutus from 42BC. There are three known and it was graded MS+. This is the coin Brutus and Cassius celebrated the murder of Julius Caesar. Roma Numismatica LLD will be auctioning the coin in the near future.

The US House of Representatives just passed this bill. The bill, H.R. 1923, would authorize:

- Circulating quarter dollars honoring women, to be issued from 2022 through 2025.
- Circulating coins in multiple denominations in 2026, celebrating the U.S. semiquincentennial.
- Circulating quarter dollars from 2027 through 2030, celebrating youth sports.
- Redesigned half dollars from 2027 through 2030, with reverses, celebrating sports performed by individuals with disabilities.
- Medals with the same designs as the coins, celebrating youth sports and sports for the disabled.
- Award medals for the 2028 Olympic Games in Los Angeles.
- Silver bullion coins with the same designs as all of the quarter dollars and half dollars,

authorized from 2022 through 2030, in the now standard 5-ounce size and in "fractional sizes."

If passed by the Senate and signed into law by the president, the legislation represents the most sweeping changes to U.S. coinage in years.

The Mint is increasing the price of 3-inch bronze medals from \$39.95 to \$160. Also, 1.5 inch medals will go from \$6.95 to \$20 as of January 1, 2021. Cases for these medals will be \$35 and \$15.

The House also approved the 2021 Silver dollars, Morgan & Peace, for 2021's 100th anniversary. The Senate needs to pass the bill.

A hoard of coins from around 650 AD was discovered in Oman, Jordan. A total of 962 silver pieces from the Sasanian and Islamic period were discovered in a blue glazed jar.

Leading the list of products with prices to be increased are the Presidential 1-ounce silver medals, only one of which was issued in 2020, honoring Andrew Jackson.

Production at the Philadelphia Mint and release of the Presidential medals depicting Martin Van Buren, William Henry Harrison and John Tyler is pushed to calendar year 2021 because of the impact of COVID-19. The price of the Presidential silver medals is being hiked to \$65, from the current \$46.

The Presidential silver medal series was introduced in August 2018 with medals for George Washington and John Adams, priced at \$39.95 each. The same price was charged in 2019 for medals depicting Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, James Monroe and John Quincy Adams.

The remaining 14 price adjustments affect these items:

- America the Beautiful Quarters Silver Proof set, currently \$46, will climb to \$60.
- Proof American Eagle 1-ounce silver dollar, currently \$64.50, will climb to \$73.
- Uncirculated American Eagle 1-ounce silver dollar, currently \$54, will rise to \$67.

➤ Proof American Eagle 1-ounce silver dollar, Bulk Pack (bulk packs are 40-coin options offered at discount to dealers), will be raised to \$2,920.

➤ American Eagle One 1-ounce silver dollar, Bulk Pack, will be raised to \$2,680.

➤ Limited Edition Silver Proof set, was \$149.95 for 2019 set, will climb to \$201.

➤ Silver Proof set was \$63.25, will rise to \$105.

➤ Uncirculated America the Beautiful 5-ounce silver coin, currently \$178.25, is boosted to \$229.

➤ Proof End of World War II 75th Anniversary American Eagle silver coin, goes on sale Nov. 9 with first pricing at \$83.

➤ End of World War II 75th Anniversary 1-ounce silver medal, first pricing, \$75.

➤ 2019 America the Beautiful Quarters Silver Proof set, was \$36.95, climbs to \$60.

➤ 2019 American Liberty, High Relief silver medal, currently \$99.95, climbs to \$175.

➤ 2019 Congratulations set, released at \$56.95, increases to \$75.

➤ 2019 Silver Proof set, released at \$54.95, increases to \$105.

Did you hear about the coin shortage? America is out of common cents!!

Here is my mini quiz from my Trivia web site and Wikipedia.

What country was the first to use paper money? China, England, Egypt or France?

If you said China, you would be correct. The Chinese invented paper, so maybe it stands to reason they would be the first country to use paper money. Even our word CASH comes from the bronze coins used

during the Tang Dynasty. The Tang Dynasty between 618-907, was considered one of the most forward periods in Chinese History. Chinese culture flourished and further matured during the Tang era. It is traditionally considered the greatest age for Chinese poetry and Tang scholars compiled a rich variety of historical literature as well as encyclopedias and geographical works. Notable innovations included the development of woodblock printing. The first bills were exchange notes, or privately issued lines of credit in China. Paper money note production boomed and after many years their money was devalued. Paper money existed until their great depression in 1455 when they abandoned paper money. It wasn't until the 1600's that paper money became common in Europe and the idea spread from there.
