. Denny's Minutia's Coins The 1943 Steel Cent by Denny Thostenson

Anyone that has been collecting Lincoln cents very long knows that the 1943 Lincoln cent stands alone from the rest of the series. Up until 1943, Lincoln cents had been struck in a metal known as Bronze. That means that the primary or base metal is 95% copper, 0.05% tin and zinc. In 1943, due to the fact that our country was fighting a war on two fronts, copper was in short supply. The mint switched to a steel planchet with a thin plating of Zinc. This decision turned out to be a disaster, numismatically speaking.

From a chemical standpoint, zinc is a very highly reactive element, as is steel. They react chemically with moisture and oxygen and other gases commonly found in our atmosphere. Due to the extremely hard planchets, dies wore out more quickly and mint errors became more common (that's a good thing, right?).

The public hated the new cents.

Years ago, I was able to obtain a metal strip from which the 1943 Lincoln cents were struck.

Blank planchets are made by a process where large sheets of metal are passed between motorized punches which punch out circular disks.

Think of the "good old days" when your mother made cookies. She would take a rolling pin (you may have to Google this to see what a rolling pin is). Once she had rolled out the cookie dough, she would take a "cookie cutter" and punch out cookies. From there, she would place the unbaked cookies on a cookie sheet and place it in the oven.

Due to space limitation, I will not go any further to explain the minting process or cookie baking.

I have included a photo of a 1943-S Lincoln cent (15% off center) and a metal strip with blanks punched out.
